





The Gifted Program, Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) of Scott County Public Schools incorporates the district standards and benchmarks at a rate and level commensurate with the student's learning abilities. A gifted/talented student is a child or youth who performs at or shows the potential for performing at a remarkably high level of accomplishment when compared to others of the same age, experience, or environment. A gifted/talented student exhibits high performance capability in an intellectual, creative, or artistic area; possesses an unusual capacity for leadership; or excels in a specific academic field. Scott County Public Schools believe in the importance of providing a program for gifted students which allows for differentiated learning experiences to meet the needs of students from all ethnic and socio-economic groups. Some strategies used to assist students in achieving; include, but are not limited to: independent study, classroom adaptations, curriculum compacting, acceleration, and enrichment. GATE provides a learning environment which compliments as well as extends the existing curriculum of the county's schools.

Valid and systematic identification, including multiple selection criteria, are used in identifying gifted students from the K-I2 student population. To ensure that a qualitatively differentiated program is provided, gifted education includes curriculum to meet both the cognitive and social/emotional needs of students. Support services, including materials and staff are provided. Services provided through GATE will enable gifted students to demonstrate skills in communication, problem solving, and self-directed learning that reflects individual uniqueness. GATE is designed to assist students in reaching their greatest potential/cognitive needs so that they may develop maximum knowledge, skills, and abilities in becoming lifelong learners and responsible citizens. Curriculum is chosen to provide challenging and unique opportunities in order to maximize learning potential. Scott County Public School's Vision is: "Every Student, Every Opportunity."









# **NUMBER OF TN/VA SCHOLARS GRADUATE**S











# Student Attendance Rate

















# **Education for ALL**

The Scott County School Board has an established program of services for students with disabilities as required by the Individuals with Disabilities Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and all applicable state and federal law. The program includes a child-find process designed to identify, locate and evaluate those children from birth to 21 inclusive who may have disabilities and may need special education and related services. The School Board ensures that a free appropriate public education is available for all children and youth with disabilities, ages 2 through 21, who are residents of Scott County.

The School Board ensures that students with disabilities and their parents or guardians are guaranteed the appropriate procedural safeguards in the process of identification, evaluation, placement, and provision of an appropriate education program. To the maximum extent appropriate, students with disabilities are educated with children who are not disabled. Prior to the identification, evaluation, placement, or provision of a free appropriate public education to a disabled student, a full explanation of all procedural safeguards is made available to parents.

An Individualized Education Program (IEP) shall be designed and maintained for each child eligible for special education under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. The program will be developed in a meeting with the child's teachers, parent(s), the student (when appropriate), a school division representative qualified to provide or supervise the provision of special education services and other individuals at the discretion of the parents or school division in accordance with state and federal law. This IEP shall be reviewed at least annually.

The IEP shall be inclusive of areas specified by state and federal statutes and regulations.

The School Board ensures compliance with the following requirements for special education and will provide support services and programs to achieve the following goals.

- A free appropriate public education will be available for each child, ages 2 to 21, inclusive, residing in the school division (FAPE).
- All children, ages 2 to 21, inclusive, residing in the school division who are disabled and need special education and related services are identified, located, evaluated and placed in an appropriate educational program (Child Identification) consistent with applicable law.
- Children with disabilities and their parents, guardians or surrogates are guaranteed procedural safeguards in the process of identification, evaluation, and educational placements (Procedural Safeguards).
- To the maximum extent appropriate, children with disabilities will be educated with children who are not disabled (LRE).
- Confidential records of children with disabilities shall be properly maintained (Confidentiality).

- Testing and evaluative materials utilized for the purpose of classification and placement of children with disabilities are selected and administered so as not to be racially or culturally discriminatory (Protection in Evaluation Process).
- An individualized education program for each child with disabilities will be maintained (IEP).
- Surrogate parents will be appointed, when appropriate, to act as advocates to serve the educational interest of children, a ges 2 to 21, inclusive, who are suspected of being or are determined to be disabled (Surrogates).
- A comprehensive system of personnel development, to include the in-service training of general and special education instructional and support personnel, related to the needs of children with disabilities is provided (CSPD).
- There will be on-going parent or guardian consultation (Parent Involvement).
- A full educational opportunity goal is provided for all children with disabilities from birth to age 21, inclusive, including appropriate career education, prevocational education, and vocational education (Full Opportunity).

### Section 504

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 is a federal civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against individuals on the basis of a disability. Section 504 specifically states that no otherwise qualified individual with a disability shall, solely by reason of his/her disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance. Section 504 requires that the needs of students with disabilities be met a adequately as the needs of their non-disabled peers.

As defined in the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended and its implementing regulations (to be referred to as Section 504), a student with a disability is one who: 1) has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activity; 2) has a record of such impairment; or 3) is regarded as having such an impairment.

For a person to be covered under Section 504, the individual must be otherwise qualified, meaning that a person with a disability must be qualified to do something before the presence of a disability can be a factor in discrimination. Therefore, if a person wants to participate in some activity, but the individual is not otherwise qualified for that activity, not allowing the person to participate would not be considered discrimination.

Although Section 504 and the IDEA are similar in many respects, there are also a number of differences. Some students with qualified disabilities may be protected by Section 504 but not be eligible for services under the IDEA. For eligibility purposes, the IDEA defines specific disabilities and criteria. Eligibility entitles the student to special education (specialized instruction) and related services as described in the student's Individualized Education Program (IEP). On the other hand, Section 504 protects all students with qualified disabilities. A Section 504 Plan is developed for students determined eligible under this statute. Section 504 is a much broader civil rights act when compared with the IDEA, which is an entitlement act.

# **TECHNOLOGY**

During the 2018-2019 school year, Scott County Public Schools (SCPS) expanded on the previous 1:1 Chromebook Initiative by distributing Chromebooks to each fifth and sixth grade student making the 1:1 initiative reach from 5th-12 grades countywide. In addition, classroom sets of Chromebooks were placed in all 3rd and 4th grade classrooms.

A robotics pilot program was started at Weber City Elementary and Hilton Elementary in 5th and 6th grades and at Dungannon Intermediate in 6th and 7th grades. Classrooms were given a Dash Robot, Dot Robot, Kindle Fire tablet, challenge cards, and a Wonder Pack with accessories. Instructional Technology Resource Teachers assisted teachers with getting students familiar with coding using online resources like Code.org, Tynker, and Code Combat. After students had some block coding experience, they were paired together with classmates to being working through the Wonder curriculum and programming the robots. At the end of the year, students were able to show case their knowledge with a presentation in front of their peers at the Scott County Career & Technical Center. During the summer of 2019, robotic programs were purchased for Nickelsville Elementary, Rye Cove Intermediate, Shoemaker Elementary, and Yuma Elementary.

Instructional Technology Resource Teachers provided professional development during teacher planning times and afterschool to help teachers stay updated with the latest updates in not only the Google Suite but other instructional technology as well.
