#### MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING-TUESDAY, OCTOBER 2, 2018

The Scott County School Board met for a regular meeting on Tuesday, October 2, 2018 at 6:30 p.m. at the Scott County School Board's Central Office, with the following members present:

<u>CALL TO ORDER/MOMENT OF SILENCE/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:</u> Chairman Quillen called the regular meeting of the Scott County School Board to order at 6:30 p.m. and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The members and audience observed a moment of silence and Mr. David Templeton led in citing the *Pledge of Allegiance*.

<u>APPROVAL OF AGENDA:</u> On a motion by Mr. Steve Sallee, seconded by Mr. Larry Horton, all members voting aye, the Board voted to approve the agenda as presented for the October 2, 2018 regular meeting.

<u>APPROVAL OF SEPTEMBER 4, 2018 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES:</u> On a motion by Mr. David Templeton, seconded by Ms. Linda Gillenwater, all members voting aye, the Board voted to approve the minutes of the September 4, 2018 regular meeting as presented.

<u>APPROVAL OF CLAIMS:</u> On a motion by Mr. Gail McConnell, seconded by Mr. Steve Sallee, all members voting aye, the Board voted to approve the claims as follows:

<u>PUBLIC COMMENT:</u> Mr. Scot Fleming, VEA representative spoke briefly to the Board offering his appreciation for what they do for the staff of Scott County; and Ms. Kathy Musick also spoke briefly to the Board thanking them for their support of Scott County Staff and stated how good it was to see everyone at the Pre-Service events.

**RECOGNITION OF RETIREE:** Mr. Jason Smith and Superintendent Ferguson recognized Karen Linkous with a resolution for her years of service with Scott County as Human Resource Manager and Clerk of the Board. They presented her with the resolution and thanked her for her contribution to Scott County.

### **SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:**

Superintendent Ferguson informed the Board of the 2018 Recognition of the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries and stated that Gate City Middle School and Gate City High School were recognized as 2018 VA Naturally Schools.

<u>APPROVAL OF HEAD START AUGUST 2018 FINANCIAL REPORT:</u> On a motion by Mr. Gail McConnell, seconded by Mr. Steve Sallee, all members voting aye, the Board voted to approve the August 2018 Head Start financial report as presented. (Appendix A)

<u>APPROVAL OF HEAD START DIRECTOR'S REPORT, AUGUST 2018:</u> On a motion by Mr. David Templeton, seconded by Mr. Larry Horton, all members voting aye, the Board voted to approve the August 2018 Head Start Director's report as presented.

Superintendent Ferguson presented to the Board on behalf of Ms. Kathy Wilcox, Head Start Director, the 2017-18 Head Start Information Report and the 2017-18 Early Head Start Information Report for their information and gave time for their review and any questions regarding the information.

Superintendent Ferguson covered the Region VII 2018 Data as presented in the handout highlighting that out of 132 divisions in the state of Virginia, Scott County ranked 6<sup>th</sup> overall in the State in SOL scores. He offered his congratulations to the students, staff and administration of Scott County for producing such high results. Mr. Ferguson went on to state that Scott County ranked 131<sup>st</sup> per pupil expenditure which includes all federal, state, and local monies. He went on to explain when federal monies are excluded, Scott County ranked 132<sup>nd</sup> in state and local money per pupil expenditures. In lieu of this statistics, Superintendent Ferguson reiterated that Scott County still ranked 6<sup>th</sup> highest in the state of Virginia in overall EOC/SOL pass rate scores. (Appendix B)
